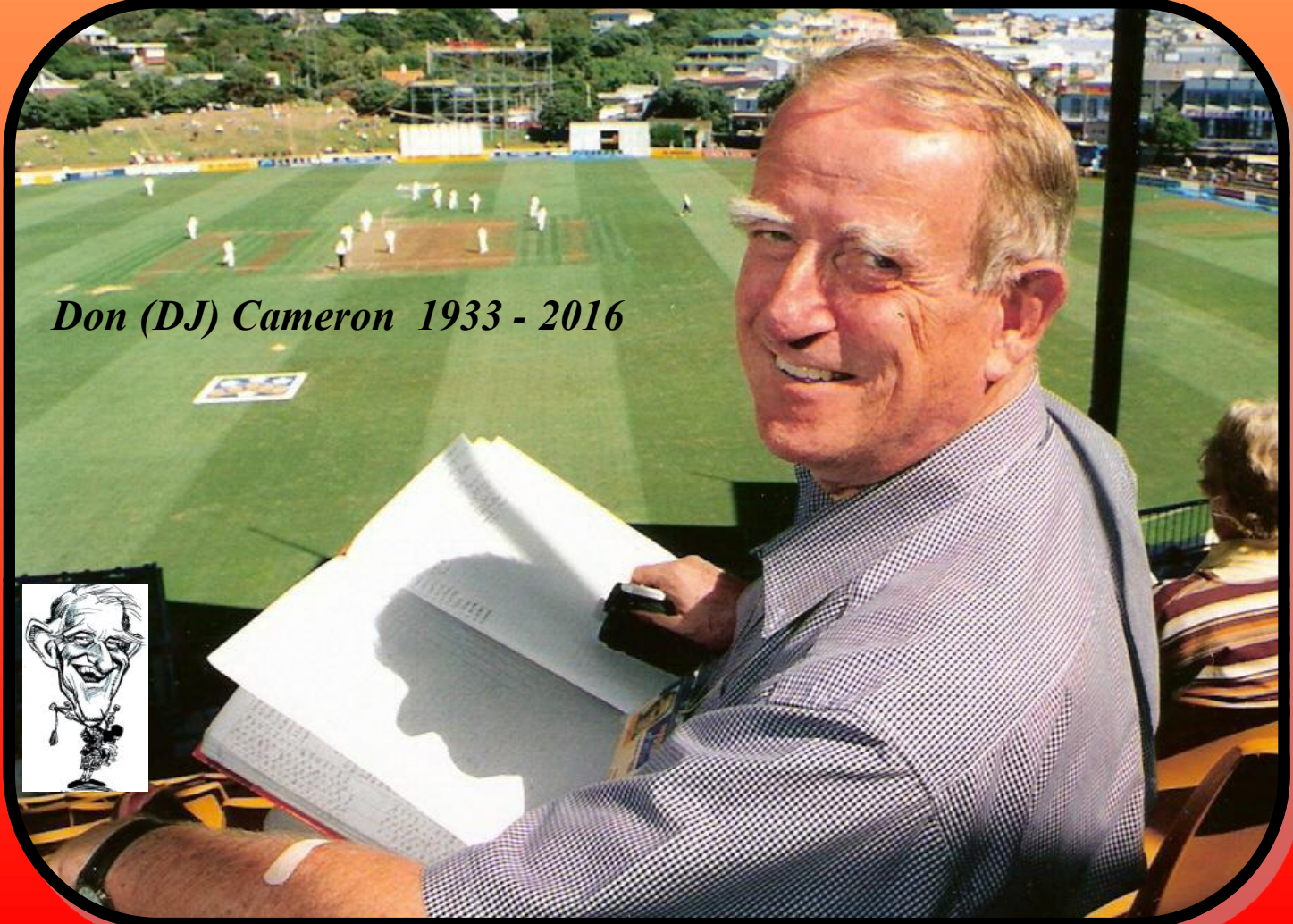

David has now been awarded the Arts Access Aotearoa Artistic Achievement Award 2016, for his outstanding achievements and contribution to traditional and contemporary Maori arts.

The awards were hosted by the Hon. Maggie Barry, Minister for Arts, Culture and Heritage, in the Banquet Hall of Parliament.

At the presentation the Judges said “ the decoration of the Whareni has bought huge mana to David and his community. His commitment, passion, achievements and contribution to mahi toi shine like a beacon across Aotearoa, New Zealand.

David is acknowledged nationally as a senior Ceramic Artist and a mentor for emerging ceramists. Art Access Aotearoa receives core funding from Creative New Zealand.

David's Great Grandfather, Donald McPherson Cameron, and family came to New Zealand in 1859. Donald was the eldest son of John Cameron of Corrychoillie.

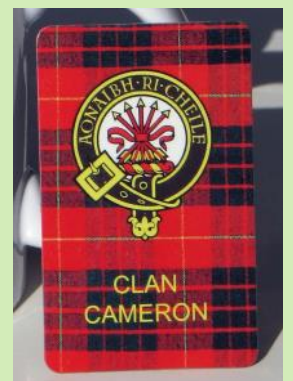

Genetic Genealogy and the Clan Cameron DNA Project - follow up points.

There was a big response to my article in the June Clan Newsletter, and a number of people have ordered up kits from Family Tree DNA. We now have representatives from at least 4 of the Cameron Families who lived at Turakina and arrived to NZ onboard the Blenheim in 1840 as well as other Cameron family lines.

Although the Paternal Y DNA testing is the main focus of the Clan Cameron Project I wanted to talk a bit more about the Autosomal DNA (Family Finder) tests which can work very well alongside the Y DNA tests.

Autosomal DNA (atDNA) is a term used in genetic genealogy to describe DNA which is inherited from the autosomal chromosomes. Every person has 46 chromosomes in total, 23 from each parent. 2 of these 46 chromosomes are the sex chromosomes. The other 44 are autosomal chromosomes.

The autosomal chromosomes come in pairs, with one chromosome from each parent in every pair. The 22 pairs are numbered 1 through 22.

The Family Finder test, nicknamed “Cousin Finder”, is for both men and women. This test is designed to find relatives on any of your ancestral lines within the last five generations

or so. It is often a good idea to get the oldest living relative in your family tested as they are closer in generation to the ancestors. The more family you test the better.

Autosomal tests are nowhere near as easy to interpret as Y-chromosome or mt tests, but they are affordable, currently priced at fDNA for \$79 USD + p&p, and are very popular. This test cannot distinguish between matches from your mother’s side versus your father’s side.

Autosomal DNA is chopped up and shared between families within a fairly small number of generations, so that only close relatives will normally share long stretches of autosomal DNA. But often long stretches of DNA are also preserved down a number of generations from an obscure common ancestor. These long stretches of near-identical DNA are measured in centimorgans (cM). Typical comparison measures include the total length of near-identical segments down to a minimum size of say 5cM, or the length of the largest matching segment. The segments’ size is a key factor in determining whether and how closely two people are related

The Family Finder test also has a component called myOrigins. This component gives you a breakdown of your ethnic makeup by percent. myOrigins compares your DNA to reference populations around the world that have been tested through scientific research. Your myOrigins results can go back in time much further than your matches. I would like to mention at this point that with DNA testing everything is done online, with the exception of doing the actual test itself.

Once you have ordered the DNA kit, fDNA establish an online account for the user and everything else is done via that account. You can track the progress of the testing, establish a

Family Tree for your matches to view, join up to Name Projects as well as view your results and matches once the testing process is finished.

Once your Family Finder test results are in you will most likely have hundreds of matches, and then your detective work will begin in earnest! Many of your matches you will never be able to find a paper trail back to a shared common ancestor. If you are lucky certain family names will pop out but the reality is a lot of work and collaboration between matches to find the MRCA (Most Recent Common Ancestor).

There will be a point where you may start to see patterns of names emerge which connect on a certain chromosome, particularly if you are part of an extended name project like our Clan Project and/or have had a number of known family members tested. You can then use this data to build a DNA profile of an ancestor.

There are many blogs, websites and webinars out there to help with any of the Genetic Genealogy topics. Here are some that I recommend:

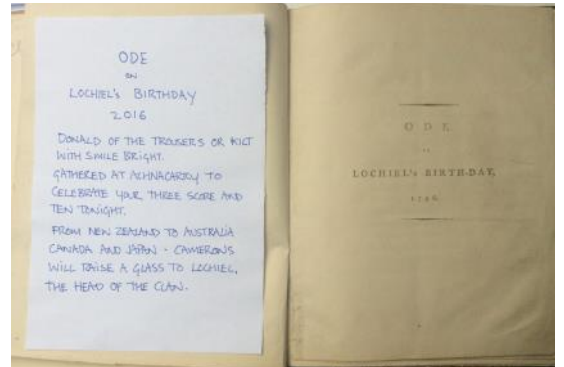
The newest resident is Haskeir, pictured right, a beautiful Highland Stallion who is getting stronger by the day.

Dr. Archie Cameron - Part 1

A Highland Gentleman to the end

Dr. Archie Cameron is most notably remembered as being the last man to be executed for supporting the Jacobite cause in 1753. However his early life in Lochaber prior to being involved with the Jacobite Rising of 1745 makes for interesting reading as a father, husband, brother, and most notably as a doctor.

Like many people, I was aware of parts of his life from reading books and having conversations with folk over the years. In fact only last year two new books were published on the life of Dr. Archie. Both of them were launched in Lochaber on the same evening. The first and more substantial title being, Doctor Archie, The life and times of Doctor Archibald Cameron by Mary McGrigor. The other title being, The Last Jacobite Martyr, by Sonia Cameron Jacks.

Both books are well-researched and give an insight in to the life and times of this well regarded highland physician in the period leading up to his untimely death in 1753.

Archie Cameron was the fourth son of John and Isobel Cameron of Lochiel. Born at old Achnacarry House in the same year in which the act of union was signed between Scotland and England.

The first Achnacarry House was by all accounts an imposing and substantial wooden structure situated alongside where the present day Steading buildings are. The only remnant of this House that exists is the lone stone chimneystack close to the Steadings.

Archie's early life would have been very much connected to the land and members of the wider clan that lived upon it. Deer stalking and fishing would have been a necessary and much loved past times on the Achnacarry Estate, which in the early 1700's would have been more extensive than the present day land holding.

Under the old clan system it was commonplace for the sons of the chief to be fostered out during their younger years to other family members, or cadet branches of the clan. In young Archie's case he would spend some time with the Camerons of Glendessary, located beyond the head of Loch

Arkaig, some fourteen or so miles distant from his parents house at Achnacarry.

Glen Dessary and the adjoining Glen Pean would have supported a good number of families working the land as shepherds and crofters in the early 1700's.

Running through Glendessary recently, I was aware of a number of rectangular stone piles where houses had once stood. There was a family staying up at the house at the far end of Glendessary called A'Chuil up until the 1950's. It is now a mountain bothy.

The present day Glen Dessary is noted for it's large shooting lodge and the wild boar that roam the glen.

Archie was brought up speaking Gaelic and English. His

early years offered the freedom to ride horseback through the glen, learning essential swordsmanship skills and stalking. All of which would have grounded his ideals and set his moral compass for helping others less fortunate than himself with an empathy and understanding for of living in a remote landscape where independence and interdependence ran hand in hand.

After Archie's father went into exile in France after the Jacobite rising of 1715. Young Archie and his brother Euan are believed to have been sent to Stirling to attend St Ninians School, where their fees were covered by Cameron of Glendessary.

Donald John Cameron -

20 February 1933 – 7 September 2016

Don joined the NZ Herald in 1950 straight from school. First yachting, then assisting TP McLean reporting on rugby and then cricket. He became a master wordsmith – clear, incisive descriptions of games that gave the reader a sense of the drama of the contest and of the atmosphere. Rugby and cricket trips abounded – rugby took him all round NZ, and many trips overseas including France and South Africa. Cricket took Don twice to the Caribbean and, of course, Australia. He had good rapport with players and administrators but would stand his ground if principle demanded – huge respect was gained as a result. Glowing testimonials attesting to Don's contribution to sports journalism have already appeared in the NZ Herald and the Barbarian Rugby Club's newsletter.

Don also contributed greatly to Clan Cameron NZ. A real stalwart – a past President of Auckland Branch, Don greatly valued his Scottish heritage and

worked very hard to promote the Clan here and to grow it's membership.

Born in Dunedin, Don's schooling was there and, later, at St Bedes, Oamaru, where he gained his interest in sport. His grandfather, John B. Cameron, came out from Lochaber with several brothers including Donald A. Cameron who founded Glenfalloch (now Nokomai) Station in the Nevis Valley of Central Otago. Donald acquired several other large runs and John managed some of them – Closeburn (on Lake Whakatipu) and Fassifern (near Tapanui). WG Rees, a cousin and godfather, of WG Grace was a neighbouring runholder on Lake Whakatipu – a cricketing connection even then!

Don loved his sport – his work wasn't, really, work but, as he entitled his autobiography published in 1998 – "Someone had to do it". Our sincerest condolences go to Valmar, Fiona, Mark and Adam.
