### Alexander 'King' Cameron (1810-1881) *by Norman Cameron*

A lexander Cameron, overlander and pastoralist, was known to his contemporaries as "King" Cameron, founder of Penola S.A. Born on 18th August 1810 in Lochaber. Inverness'shire. He was the fourth of nine children of John Cameron, saw miller, and Margaret, nee Fraser. One of his earliest memories as a four year old would have been hearing the news of of the death of his uncle Angus at Quatre Bras and the wounding of his uncle Donald at Waterloo. He attended school at Inverroy near Ben Nevis, and worked as a shepherd before obtaining an assisted passage on the *Boyne* to Sydney. The healthy, literate, six foot, 28 year-old Highlander catholic stepped on ashore on 2nd January 1839 with 101 other enterprising Cameron's.

He immediately embarked on an epic clan trek droving sheep to Port Phillip, following the wheel ruts left by Major Mitchell's bullock wagons three years previously. One of his uncles Duncan Cameron (1801- 1860) settled on the Glen Roy Run, named after his birth place and now a Melbourne suburb, while another, Alexander 'Black Sandy' Cameron (1791- 1858) advanced into Australian Felix to pioneer Monte Sturgeon Plains, near Dunkeld. A fellow clansman, Donald Cameron (1818- 1890), established Clunes in 1840, where gold was later discovered.

After marrying Margaret MacKillop, daughter of John and Helen nee McNab, in St Francis' Church, Melbourne on 27th of June 1843, Cameron continued to overland his sheep westwards to new pastures in South Australia where he was first to apply, on the 19th December 1845, for the 48 square mile Occupation licences surrounding the future site of Penola. This frontier venture, subsequently in partnership with his uncle 'Black Sandy', prospered, as did a lucrative sideline shipping remounts to the Indian cavalry, prepared by local November 2019. Eighteen members and two guests enjoyed the get-together in fine warm weather in the beautiful countryside by the Ruamahanga River.



Our next event will be a presentation by Rob & Cath Cameron on their recent journey

of approximately 8,000 kilometres on the Trans-Siberian express from Shanghai to St. Petersburg. We especially look forward to hearing about their spell staying in a yurt in Mongolia. More information will be provided to members when a date and venue has been organised.

horse breaker and poet, Adam Lindsey Gordon, who 'received the greatest kindness' from 'Highland gentlemen' while recovering from a violent kick to the groin.

Having built the original Royal Oak Hotel by 1848, Cameron encouraged his station tradesmen to establish their own independent businesses by purchasing 80 freehold acres on the 4th of April 1850, which he sub-divided to found the private township of Penola. He initiated the renowned Penola races in 1852, with their famous highland balls and would drive through the township to the racecourse with a piper in full blast and ribbons flying' to the great astonishment of his nostalgic kinsmen. Handsome and commanding in stature, but with a curiously falsetto voice and a strong highland accent, he was remembered as 'a fellow....like the highland chief both in person and hospitality.

The Cameron's 18 year old niece, Mary MacKillop, joined the family as governess in 1860, and soon met the charismatic local scientist and priest, Julian Tenison Woods, with whom she founded the Sisters of St Joseph. Tragedy struck in 1863, when Cameron's 42 year-old wife Margaret died, as did his eldest daughter and his first grandson, in childbirth. Selling Penola Station the following year, he expanded his pastoral holdings on Mt Sturgeon Plains and at Avoca Forest near St Arnuad. He married 23 year old Ellen Keogh, daughter Anthony and Helen, nee Fotheringham, at Lara on 14th February 1867, where they lived at Moreland Hall, Coburg, where he died 2nd September 1881, and aged 71.

Predeceased by five children but survived by six from his first marriage and seven from his second, he was buried in the Melbourne General Cemetery, leaving a net estate of 72,000 pounds that included 22,000 freehold acres and 53,000 sheep. Alexander 'King' Cameron is commemorated today as the founder of Penola by a John Downie life sized bronze statue erected by public subscription in the main street beside his Royal Oak Hotel.

### Clan Cameron DNA Project

In late August we lost one of our longest serving Clan Cameron New Zealand members who not only lived a life of service to his community but has also left a legacy to the Cameron YDNA Project which will last forever.

Being a Great Grandson of John Corriechoillie Cameron, Fraser Cameron QSM was born to one of the most infamous of Cameron families and many stories are still told of his Great Grandfather who was an infamous Highland cattle drover in Scotland.

Because Fraser's paternal lineage is so well known and documented we knew that when he tested his YDNA the results would be extremely exciting for our Project and they didn't disappoint.

In previous articles I have written about a subclade within the Project which was significant in number but of which the sept was unknown, until now! Fraser's BigY 700 has led us to now name this subclade as McMartin Cameron thus enabling all of those within this clade to know (or in one case confirm) that they too belong to this ancient line of Cameron's.

To say Loraine and I were excited is a bit of an understatement. We couldn't have wished for a better outcome for some of the families who have for so long yearned to know where they belong in the Cameron tree. One New Zealand family who had long thought that they too were McMartin Cameron's are those who descend from Thomas Ross Cameron who emigrated from Lochaber to Australia in 1851 onboard the Sea with his wife Annie MacDonell and their young family. The family then came onto New Zealand where Thomas set up farming in the Rangitikei district. When Thomas died in 1913 his obituary alluded to him being born at Dochanassie which lies at the south-east corner of Loch Lochy and this is well known McMartin Cameron country.

Because we already have the YDNA of one of the descendants of Thomas we were able to confirm that this family were also McMartin Cameron's thanks to Fraser's testing.

Going forward we would be really interested in getting

Donald married Isabella Glasgow in Turakina in 1853. Also a reading by Capt. Robert McMillan, from Levin, for the Wanganui Robbie Burns Club.



in contact with other male Cameron descendants of John Corriechoillie Cameron. We know that John had nine sons from two wives and many of their descendants, cousins to Fraser, would most likely be here in New Zealand and also Australia. If we could get a 4th or 5th cousin of Fraser's to test it would help us to further understand the

McMartin Cameron line.

As our Project stands today we can now tell a BigY tester whether they belong to the MacGillione, McMartin or Clunes Cameron lines. The whole point of YDNA testing is to use it together with traditional genealogy to break down brick walls in family research. Our common goal and aim of the Project is to help families identify where they belong. At this time of the year Family Tree DNA have their main sales on their DNA tests. Good savings are to be found. The entry level YSTR 37 test is only \$99USD!

The sales in the mid half of 2019 brought about a good number of BigY testers who upgraded from their YSTR tests. This has resulted in the MacGillonie subclade to grow quite significantly.

As I reflect on the last extremely busy twelve months, I think of those who we have lost and those who we have also found. Time waits for nobody. I am truly thankful for the help we have from Loraine whose time and expertise come freely. The ties with our Clan Members in Australia have never been stronger and I look forward to meeting more of the Clan next year at the Gathering in Scotland where Loraine and I will present a talk about Genetic Genealogy and our Clan Project. I would also like to once again thank all of our Project members for their participation, without you there would be no Project! Our future looks bright and we look forward to more exciting finds in 2020.

These pipes have been in New Zealand 179 years and were made by Alex Glen in Edinburgh, Alex was born in 1801 and died in 1873 so when he made these pipes is any ones guess but had to be before 1840. These pipes are to be played and enjoyed at any Clan & family function.

### Cameron Square - Cearnag Chamshroin. *By Bill Cameron*

There's a lot going on in Cameron Square, or to give it its Gaelic name - Cearnag Chamshroin.

The Square is believed to take its name from the place where Cameron volunteers were gathered before being marched off to war.

Located just off the High Street, Fort William's traditional and now pedestrianised shopping and business area. Cameron Square is made up on both sides by long established grand limestone buildings, one of which includes The West Highland Museum that contains the finest collection of Jacobite artefacts.

At the top of the Square there have been a number of notable buildings in the Square's history, including: a church, town hall, tourist information centre, a cinema and more recently, a clothes shop.

Cameron Square has always been regarded by locals as the central meeting point within the town where various celebrations take place throughout the year. A recent addition to the Square has been the popular Ben Bronze Model T sculpture that celebrates the journey made up Britain's highest mountain in a Model T car which started and finished in Cameron Square back in 1911.

At the end of last year, the building at the top of the Square was demolished. Built in the early 1980's, it originally functioned as a two screen cinema complex to the rear and a tourist information centre to the front.

The sight was cleared to make way for ambitious new cinema complex and cafe/bar.

The design of the building has been inspired by vernacular Highland architecture, and in particular, the corrugated iron community hall in the near by village of Onich.

The Highland cinema, as it will be known is the idea of local entrepreneur, Angus MacDonald who has commissioned Skye based architects Dualchas to develop the design. The steel frame structure is now roofed and work is taking place on the stonework, some of which will include granite stones from near by Glen Nevis.

The Highland cinema is due to be completed for opening in May 2020, providing employment for 12 or more people in the area.

Lochaber has featured in Rob Roy, Braveheart, Skyfall and Harry Potter, amongst others as a film location. It will be good to have a cinema in the heart of Lochaber to watch new films.

### Achnagauna: A Sense of Place - Part 6 and Conclusion

#### Further Places in Scotland where John 'Mòr' Cameron lived prior to his 1840 emigration to N.Z.

Chris Doak also comes to our rescue with the meaning of the Gaelic term 'fank' and its function:

I don't think that there is any difference between a "sheepfold" and a "fank". Sheepfold is an imported English word, whereas as fank is the old Scottish word (and Gaelic faing - pronounced 'fank' as well). The smaller enclosures are probably just that - enclosures to hold a dozen sheep or so separating them at lambing time etc. The big enclosure, I would think, is for a few thousand sheep, when they gather them to take them away to the Lowland markets for slaughtering, or make use of it for dipping, or shearing.

Gaskell (1981, pp.142-143) has a small amount of description and history of Achnagauna. Achadh nan Gamhna was in 1815 (about when Big John moved there) recorded as being 544 acres in area, and was part of the larger Acharn Estate. Gaskell records the "... remains of 3 houses in 1872, now under forest ... cleared (by evictions) in 1838 ...". Based on what I can see in *Google Earth*, which includes a second unmapped large sub-circular sheep enclosure also evident in the 1988 air photos, it seems that Gaskell's record appears a little incomplete.

The club farm in Morvern about which most is known was at Achadh nan Gamhna, where six tenants farmed between them 840 sheep, forty-eight cattle and their followers and six horses on 2,265 acres of Achadh nan Gamhna, Agh Choire and Unibeg, along the southern shore of Loch Arienas. This farm may have been organised as early as 1823-24 ... it came to an end when Sellar bought Acharn in 1838 and evicted the population. (Gaskell, 1980, pp. 51-52).

In the 1841 census, no people were recorded as living here. In fact, it is only a little further up the valley that one can visit Unimore which, to its credit, the Forestry Commission has recognised as having heritage value and has not replanted over this historic scattered village. Unimore is the site of the story of the 1824 eviction of Mary of Unimore:

The people of Unnimore thought that flitting would not come upon them whilst they lived. As long as they paid their rent, and that was not hard to do, anxiety did not come near them; and a lease they asked not. It was there that the friendly neighbourhood was, though only now one smoke is to be seen from the house of the Saxon shepherd.

(MacLeod (Ed. Thornber), 2002, p.177)

The remaining feature is the large sheep enclosure (photographs 8 & 9). Most larger, usually sub-circular, sheep enclosures depicted on the early 6 inch to 1 mile O.S. maps have a small rectangular sheep fank or sheepfold attached. It is in this small area that all shearing, sorting and other functions were carried out. By contrast, sporadic small isolated rectangular sheepfolds (without a large enclosure) have also been mapped.

#### So, what went on in a Sheep Fank?

Chris Doak of Glasgow has supplied a few very old photographs that bring a sheep fank back to life, as it were. These family ?holiday photos (Photographs 10 and 11) were taken circa 1900 in a sheep fank in Ross Shire:

For your interest, I attach ... a couple of photographs that I forgot I had. This goes back to your curiosity of the sheep fank at Auchnagauna, and how it was used. My great uncle took these photos circa 1900 when he was visiting friends in the far north of Scotland, and I think that they will give you a good idea of what activities went on inside a fank

#### **Footnotes and Afterthoughts**

The trouble with embarking on a genealogical journey is that one is never quite sure where one will end up ... geographically or genealogically. During my initial meeting with Chris Doak in Glasgow, before setting out for the Highlands with the material he gave to me, he said he was reasonably sure that Alexander, the last resident Tacksman of Inver Mallie, was Big John's grandfather and therefore an ancestor of mine (oh dear ... a new research objective!). So with instructions as to where to find the graveyard, a visit to Kilmallie Cemetery was shoehorned into our itinerary - and more on Alexander in an up-coming article.

And so I sought to tread where my ancestors trod and to this end Iain Thornber at Lochaline was, and also continues to be, helpful, after my visit to Achnagauna. After going to Achnagauna, and over coffee, Iain and I had a wide-ranging conversation covering crofters and cottars, Morrison's surveys, the inaccuracies and omissions in the OPRs, the role of the seannaiche (storyteller) in the clan, the funding, financial and social problems of the Highlands today, the financial dominance of the Glasgow-Edinburgh 'belt', and resource materials and references still not on the internet. Clearly, this sort of research is both interactive and iterative; records lead to field work which leads to discoveries which lead back to the need for further field work ... and now I need to return to Scotland! If there is to be a next time, a second visit, 2020 perhaps, then much more time is needed - or am I exceeding the law of diminishing returns?
