# Fort William Landmark Destroyed by Fire

In a devastating High Street blaze early in June, the well known restaurant and nightclub, McTavish's Kitchens, was destroyed, together with the two adjoining shops.

Luckily, no one was injured but the fire will mean the loss of over 60 jobs, including those of several self employed musicians, and it is a great loss to the town's tourism industry. First Lighter Bill worked at McTavish's part time and he regarded it as a second home.

Built as Fraser's Café in 1929, the building had been McTavish's Kitchens since 1970 and held many romantic memories for the people of Lochaber. Visitors from around the world, including, I am sure, many Camerons, will be saddened at the loss of such a wonderful venue of Scottish entertainment.

When in Fort William for the late Lochiel's funeral I dined there and will always remember the spoken and sung tribute to Lochiel by the musicians.

## Flower of Scotland

In a recent online poll conducted by the Royal Scottish National Orchestra, *Flower of Scotland* was voted the most popular candidate to be sung as the Scottish National Anthem. It received 41 percent of the vote, with *Scotland the Brave* the runner up on 29 percent. The official *God Save the Queen* is not universally popular in Scotland.

Flower of Scotland was written by the late Roy Williamson of the Corries in the 1960s and remembers the battle of Bannockburn. Scotland the Brave, thought to be the favourite, was written by Cliff Hanley in the 1950s to an old bagpipe tune. It was used to salute the winners at this year's Commonwealth Games in Melbourne.

# People of Rangitikei 1870-1906

#### Poems and Songs By Backwoodsman (Louis McLachlan)

The poems of 'Backwoodsman' are being collected by the McPhail Family, Roz and Ewen Grant, Robert Amies and Bruce Cameron and brought together in a book, edited by Maisie Earle.

Louis McLachlan lived in the Rangitikei District in the last half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. He was born on 12<sup>th</sup> December 1849 in Wellington and moved to the Turakina district as a small child. He was the son of Dugald McLachlan and Jane Cameron who had moved from the Highlands of Scotland to New Zealand. He married Alice Cameron at the Turakina Manse in 1877. He died in on 23<sup>rd</sup> September 1906.

He used the name 'Backwoodsman' for his poetry. The poetry was mostly unpublished but there was some printed in the local paper and as a broadsheet.

His obituary in a local Rangitikei paper says: "He was a kindly genial soul, very popular with his acquaintances, and they were numerous, for everybody knew "Loo". He was a noted athlete in his time, and won many wrestling, jumping and running contests on the Coast. The late Mr. McLachlan was a ready and prolific writer of verse, and several of his poems have the true poetic ring. Many a man with less ability has achieved fame and fortune as a writer of poetry; but "Backwoodsman" was satisfied if he obtained the applause and approbation of his friends. He was deeply attached to the district in which he lived so long and its people."

He was obviously a very active and interested observer of the local scene, also of women, love, marriage and baptism, and death (the comings and goings) and the anniversaries (half way between). He was also enthusiastic about horses and horse racing and there are poems on races both in NZ and in Australia.

His poems are about the people and the district – as he saw them and thought about them. So in many ways, the poems are a personal historical record of how people lived and their relationships with each other.

# A Sojourn in Scotland

My sister and I have just returned from five weeks in the UK. The highlight for both of us was a visit to Scotland and the meeting of Lochiel. We had written to him to see if he would be in Achnacarry in March and the reply was he would be there 10<sup>th</sup> through to the 22<sup>nd</sup>.

We landed at Heathrow and spent a few days in London doing the tourist thing. This was my 4<sup>th</sup> visit to Britain and the 1<sup>st</sup> for my sister Christine and as it was her first visit we wanted to see as much as possible. We had booked a rental car and picked that up at Heathrow. We are Garlands on our fathers side and one of our Great Uncles had been wounded in France during WW2. He had been taken to a NZ Hospital Unit in Brockenhurst where he later died. So we wanted to visit his grave. We spent a couple of days there and as we had to be in Fort William by the 11<sup>th</sup> we had a long drive up through England. Also it was Christine's birthday on the 12<sup>th</sup> March so combining that with a visit to Achnacarry was high on our list. Our last night in England before crossing over to Scotland was in the Lake District, then it was on to Bonny Scotland.

We drove along the banks of Loch Lomond which was really lovely, then on up over the Black Mountains. I really wasn't prepared for the stark beauty of the scenery. There was plenty of snow around which for us coming from Auckland where it doesn't snow was exciting. We came down from the mountains and drove along the upper banks of Loch Linnhe to Fort William, and on to our B&B just out of Spean Bridge. The next day we went back into Fort William to the Museum there and spent an interesting time looking around. There is quite a bit of Cameron history there. I bought a book called Romantic Lochaber, Arisaig and Morar. Plenty of Cameron History in there as well. The next day was the 12<sup>th</sup> which is Christines birthday and we woke up to find that there had been a good dumping of snow over night. There were a lot of road closures in the area so we weren't able to drive anywhere. Our host very kindly offered to drive us to Glenfinnan for a look see. Earlier in the day I rang Lochiel to let him know that we had arrived and to make a time to meet him. Unfortunately he told us that his mother had passed away in

the small hours. I immediately told him that under the circumstances we understood that it wasn't possible to visit him. But being the gentleman he is he insisted that we had come such a long way that we could visit the following day.

We drove to Achnacarry the next day, which was really lovely. We finally figured out how to open the gate and drove up to the front door. Caroline, Lochiel's sister met us at the door and invited us in. Lochiel himself made us feel really relaxed and we had a cup of tea with him and then showed us a couple of the big rooms overlooking the river. We couldn't stay long as he was busy making funeral arrangements and was expecting the Vicar. Also we didn't think it appropriate to take any photos of him. We wanted to attend the funeral but at the time he wasn't sure what day it would be and that it was going to be about another week. We did leave a condolence card.

After that we stayed at Spean Bridge for another couple of days and used it as a base to travel around. Went to places like Balmoral and over the Crampian Mountains back to Spean Bridge. After that we left that beautiful part of Scotland and drove all the way to Dunnet Head, which is the northern most point on the mainland. It was very cold up there with the wind I'm sure coming off the Arctic. One of the must sees was Culloden. There is really something moving about that place. We found the Cameron stone and that was very special. I was very sorry to be leaving Scotland but we had more places to see so then we started making our way down the East coast and on back through England where we had made arrangements to meet more of our Garland family. But the Highlands are very special and the history and the grandeur will remain with us both always. Who knows, maybe I will get to go back.

# Scots in New Zealand: An Exhibition at Te Papa, 2007

The fifth Te Papa community exhibition to be staged in the Community Gallery area of Te Papa will profile New Zealand's Scottish community and is scheduled to open in midlate 2007. The exhibition has a proposed duration of approximately 2.7 years, closing early in 2010. The Community Gallery explores the experiences of different ethnic and cultural groups in New Zealand and provides a forum in which different communities can tell their own stories.

This exhibition is being developed in partnership with the Scottish Community Advisory Group (CAG). This group of seven people was formed from a much larger meeting of representatives held in December last year. Three members of Clan Cameron are involved – Roz Grant, Bruce Cameron, and Maisie Earle. Roz brings her extensive knowledge of Scottish Settlement in the Rangitikei, particularly Turakina, Bruce his knowledge of piping and piping history, and Maisie represents recent immigrants.

This exhibition is primarily focused on New Zealand rather than Scottish history. The CAG have endorsed the overarching theme of `contributions' for the exhibition and the main storylines. CAG feedback is being taken into account throughout the progression of the exhibition.

The exhibition is still being formed, though three main segments are confirmed. These will focus on Migration and Set-

ments are confirmed. These will focus on Migration and Set tlement, Contributions, and Maintaining Identity. A touchscreen interactive map is one of the main interpretive tools being considered for the small Migration and Settlement area of the exhibition. The Contributions segment will act as a touchstone for various achievements and contributions of Scottish New Zealanders, and in Maintaining Identity there is more of a focus on contemporary New Zealand stories. The exhibition will include some audiovisual elements.

Those of Scottish descent are a major group in the New Zealand population. Through this exhibition Te Papa hopes to show visitors that Scottish culture is a pervasive influence in contemporary New Zealand culture. The achievements of Scottish New Zealanders will be celebrated, and links to various websites will provide an opportunity for visitors to make personal associations with their Scottish heritage.

Objects for display are currently being chosen from the collections of a range of organisations. Te Papa will also work with CAG to source further information on possible objects for selection, especially those that may be held in private collections.

Te Papa's Community Relations Manager, Sue Superville, sends out a quarterly newsletter to Advisory Group members, representatives of the broad Scottish community, lenders and contributors to the exhibition. The newsletter contains updates on significant exhibition developments, related events and key dates throughout the year. The first newsletter relating to this exhibition will be ready in late July.

### N.Z. Highland Dancing Competitions 2006

I had the pleasure and honour of presenting the **Mr and Mrs I.D. Cameron Cup** at the N.Z. Highland Dancing Championships in Auckland held 7-9 July 2006.

My pleasure was in seeing that there were such large numbers, 190 young New Zealanders performing, hearing the buzz of excitement in the theatre, seeing the high standard of dress, and watching the swirl of their kilts as they crossed smartly across the stage. The discipline and self confidence of these competitors was a credit to their teachers, judges and the organisation of this competition. Of course behind each dancer is a dedicated family and hours of hard work by the performers but on the day one sensed real enjoyment and challenge.

It was also my pleasure to meet again some of those whom I had known during those hectic years when my parents were working with passion to develop the Royal Academy of Highland and National Dancing.

As a child I accompanied my Mother when she judged Highland Dancing in the 1930s and 1940s. It has been documented that these were the "years of discontent" and in 1945 "It was found that often judges had no qualification to Judge, and indeed had never had dance tuition". I remember that "discontent" upsetting my Judging Mother as there

were no set standards for dress or dance. This made comparisons difficult and sometimes irate teacher or family would challenge results of competition. There was a need for standards of dress and dance steps.

In 1945 the N.Z Academy of Highland and National Dancing was born in my family home. Two Foundation Members, May Wilson [Thorn] and my Mother Fassie Cameron [McDougall] were appointed. Both were outstanding dancers, teachers and judges. For weeks they discussed and analysed every dance and every step; often in the midst of cooking a big roast meal, these two would stop to dance and check techniques! Out of "discontent" came challenges accepted by more and more dedicated teachers and judges. Always encouraging them was my father, Ian Cameron who was passionate about preserving our Scottish Heritage.

My childhood was filled with the sound of 'the Pipes', the swirl of the kilts, the spring in the steps of fine dancers, and the lilt in the Scottish dialect spoken so it was thrilling to see large numbers of enthusiastic, skilled dancers performing. In their care our Scottish traditions are alive and well.
